

Have you ever wondered how children learn to read? The following model and explanation can help you understand why we explicitly teach systematic, synthetic phonics and have a structured literacy instruction program aligned with the Science of Reading at Jamieson Primary School.



In 2001, Dr. Hollis Scarborough created the Reading Rope using pipe cleaners to illustrate how the different "strands" of reading are interconnected yet distinct. This model captures the complexity of learning to read, which can be challenging for many students. Scarborough's Reading Rope is comprised of lower and upper strands that work together to form skilled and fluent reading with strong comprehension. The lower strands include **word recognition** skills such as phonemic awareness, decoding, and sight word recognition. These components are crucial for recognizing and pronouncing words accurately.


The upper strands focus on **language comprehension**, which involves understanding vocabulary, sentence structure, and narrative elements. These skills help students grasp the meaning behind the words and integrate their prior knowledge to make sense of the text. When these strands intertwine effectively, they support each other and lead to proficient reading. Strong word recognition facilitates smooth and automatic reading, while solid comprehension skills enhance understanding and engagement with the text. Encouraging practices that build both sets of skills—like phonics instruction, reading aloud, and discussing stories—can help children develop into proficient readers. Remember to keep reading with your child every day!
